Call to Order

Acting Chairman Sara Griffen and Chairman Barnabas McHenry called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

Acting Conservancy Chairman Sara Griffen led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Tribute to Pete Seeger

Sarah Griffen introduced a musical and video tribute to Pete Seeger who recently passed away. The Board noted with a mixture of fondness and sadness the pivotal role Pete played in the cleanup and restoration of the Hudson River as a healthy and vibrant biological, recreational, and publically accessible resource.

Welcome and Introductions

Chairman McHenry welcomed Sally Mazzarella who has been appointed to the Council by the Senate Majority Leader.

Chairman McHenry introduced FDR Presidential Library Director Lynn Bassanese who welcomed everyone to the Wallace Center and congratulated the Boards on the continued funding of the National Heritage Area. She briefed everyone on the recently completed three year restoration and renovation of the library, the first since 1941.

Chairman McHenry introduced Dutchess County Executive and Greenway Conservancy Member Marcus Molinaro who welcomed everyone to Dutchess County and encouraged all to visit the “new” presidential library. Mr. Molinaro wondered who will step up to fill the big shoes of Pete Seeger or retired Congressman Maurice Hinchey. He noted that Pete himself suggested that it would take millions of people to make his dream work. He stated that government works best when aggravated, advocated to, agitated and pushed. He concluded by urging the Greenway to fulfill its role in continuing Pete’s work.

Acting Chairman Griffen introduced State Senator Terry Gipson who welcomed everyone to his district and said he had become involved with the Greenway during the Rhinebeck sidewalk project that was paid for in part with a Greenway Grant. He advocated for full funding of the Environmental Protection Fund and invited the Board to work with his office.

Acting Chairman Griffen introduced Assemblywoman Didi Barrett who welcomed everyone to her district and spoke about the new power lines issue, particularly with respect to possible eminent domain concerns. Ms. Barrett invited the Board to work with her office.

Acting Chairman Griffen introduced Town of Hyde Park Deputy Supervisor Emily Svenson who welcomed everyone to her town and noted their concentration on infrastructure and trails. She concluded by expressing her pleasure and the inspiration she feels when attending Greenway meetings, and was particularly interested in this meeting's speakers.

Presentation: Beacon Institute for Rivers and Estuaries

Chairman McHenry introduced Timothy Sugrue, Ph.D. the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Beacon Institute for Rivers and Estuaries. Dr. Sugrue reviewed the Institute from its founding in 2001, its merger with Clarkson University in 2011, its mission of education, science and technology, and public policy. Much of the monitoring work being done by the Institute may be found by visiting www.bire.org.

Presentation: Hudson River Estuary Program

Chairman McHenry introduced longtime Board member and Delegate Fran Dunwell of the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation's Hudson River Estuary Program. Ms. Dunwell noted that her program is rooted in science and natural resources. Elements of the program include clean water, fish and wildlife, river access, resilient communities, natural scenery, and vital ecosystems. The program is organized around Action Agendas and works with a separate, but cooperating monitoring system called the Hudson River Environmental Conditions Observing System (HRECOS).

Agenda Review

Acting Chairman Griffen announced the addition of a grant for the Town of Hurley to the Greenway planning Grants section of the Council meeting and called for other changes/additions to the agenda. There being no others she moved onto the rest of the agenda.

Hudson River Valley Greenway Communities Council

Call to Order

Chairman McHenry called the Greenway Council meeting to order.

Update on 2014-15 New York State Budget

Acting Executive Director Mark Castiglione reviewed the Governor's proposed budget which contains \$166,000 for Conservancy operations; and \$185,000 for council operations and \$136,000 for Council grants.

Business Service Center Service Level Agreement for Greenway Communities Council

Mr. Castiglione introduced a proposed agreement between the Council and NYS Office of General Services (OGS) Business Service Center (BSC). The BSC is a newly created part of OGS that handles some of the council's bill payment chores that used to be handled by the NYS Division of the Budget. As part of this new arrangement the BSC is requiring each agency that it hosts to enter an agreement as to roles and responsibilities. On a motion from Chairman McHenry (Sally Mazzarella second) the Board unanimously authorized Mr. Castiglione to execute the agreement.

Greenway Community Planning Grants

Mr. Castiglione announced the Grants Committee recommendations for Greenway Communities and Compact Grants.

The *Town of Brunswick, Rensselaer County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$10,000 for the Town of Brunswick Zoning Code Update and pending completion of paperwork on their current grant. The Committee recommended an award of \$5,000 and restricting the grant to tasks one through five inclusive as set forth in the grant application.

The *Town of Clarkstown and Village of Upper Nyack, Rockland County* are seeking grant funding in the amount of \$20,000 for the Rockland Farm Alliance Farmland Expansion Program. The Committee recommended an award of \$5,000.

The *Village of Nyack, Rockland County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$8,250 for a Nyack Green Village Action Plan. The Committee recommended an award of \$5,000.

The *Town of Hurley, Ulster County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$10,000 for an Open Space Plan Update. The Committee recommended an award of \$5,000.

The *Town of Marlborough, Ulster County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$10,000 for a Comprehensive Plan Update. The Committee recommended an award of \$5,000.

The *Town of Granville, Washington County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$2,500 for Implementing Part Two of Planning for Town Comprehensive Plan for Town of Granville. The Committee recommended an award of \$1,500.

Greenway Compact Grants

The *Village of Mamaroneck, Westchester County* is seeking grant funding in the amount of \$22,000.00 for Phase III Compact Implementation: Real Estate Market Analysis and Redevelopment Plan for Mamaroneck's Industrial Area. The Committee recommended an award of \$6,500.

On a motion from Bob Elliott (Sally Mazzarella second) the Council unanimously approved the grants as recommended by the Grants Committee.

Greenway Conservancy for the Hudson River Valley, Inc.

Call to Order

Acting Chairman Griffen called the Conservancy meeting to order.

Welcome New Conservancy Board Member – Hon. Dini LoBue, Putnam County Legislator

Acting Chairman Griffen welcomed in absentia new Conservancy member the Hon. Dini LoBue, Putnam County Legislator. Ms. LoBue was unable to make this meeting.

Resolution of Recognition for Ken Herman, Outgoing Greenway Conservancy Treasurer

Ms. Griffen announced a Resolution of Recognition for outgoing Treasurer Ken Herman, who has been the Treasurer of the Conservancy since the early 1990's.

Vote to appoint new Greenway Conservancy Treasurer and Secretary

Ms. Griffen announced that Kevin Burke has agreed to resign the position of Secretary in order to take up the role of Treasurer. Jennifer Schwartz Berky has agreed to become the Secretary. Ms. Griffen then asked if there were any other nominations. There being none, on a motion from Jane Daniels (Cindy Lanzetta second) the Board unanimously made the two new officer appointments.

New Greenway Grants Committee Member – Jennifer Schwartz Berky

Ms. Griffen announced the appointment of Jennifer Schwartz Berky to the Greenway Grants Committee replacing Ken Herman who has resigned.

Results of Greenway Conservancy Audit

Finance Manager Scott Keller reviewed the recently completed audit of the Greenway Conservancy for the Hudson River Valley, Inc. and Greenway Heritage Conservancy HRV, Inc. The auditors' final report have been received and both audits contained unqualified opinions and did not have any items listed on the management letters. On a motion from Cindy Lanzetta (Jane Daniels second) the Board unanimously accepted the audit findings.

Business Service Center Service Level Agreement for Greenway Conservancy

Mr. Castiglione introduced a proposed agreement between the Conservancy and NYS Office of General Services (OGS) Business Service Center (BSC). The BSC is a newly created part of OGS that handles some of the council's bill payment chores that used to be handled by the NYS Division of the Budget. As part of this new arrangement the BSC is requiring each agency that it hosts to enter an agreement as to roles and responsibilities. On a motion from Jane Daniels (Cindy Lanzetta second) the Board unanimously authorized Mr. Castiglione to execute the agreement.

Flex Spending Plan Amendment – to allow carryover from prior years

Mr. Keller introduced an amendment to the Greenway Conservancy's flex spending plan. New IRS regulations allow employees to carry forward contributions up to \$500 made in one year to the following year. There is no cost to the organization for this change, but a resolution adopting the plan must be made by the Board.

Fund Transfer to NYSDEC for Stuyvesant Public Access Project

Mr. Castiglione explained that the Conservancy was awarded an environmental benefit settlement for construction of a boat launch in Stuyvesant. After many years of numerous state and local agencies attempting to complete this project a kayak launch and parking and picnic area will be built at the Nutten Hook component of the Hudson River National Estuarine Research Reserve. This site is already

designated as part of the Hudson River Greenway Water trail. He asked for the authority to transfer those funds to the NYS DEC.

On a motion from Stefan Yarabek (Jane Daniels second) the Board authorized both the Flex Benefit Spending Plan amendment and the possible transfer of funds to the DEC.

Greenway Trail Designation

Mr. Castiglione announced that Wave Hill in the Bronx has requested designation of 1.67 miles of their trails. As part of the designation process the Board will be asked to vote on both SEQR and Designation resolutions.

Greenway Trail Designations

Mr. Castiglione announced that requests for designations for the following trails have been received:

- Quiet Cove Riverfront Park Trails, Dutchess County – SEQR Resolution and Designation Resolution (0.7 mile, riverside)
- Dutchess Rail Trail, Dutchess County - SEQR Resolution and Designation Resolution (14 miles, riverside and countryside)
- Wilcox Memorial Park Trail System, Dutchess County - SEQR Resolution and Designation Resolution (6 miles, countryside)
- Bowdoin Park Trail System, Dutchess County - SEQR Resolution and Designation Resolution (3 miles, riverside)
- Gateway to Peck's Pond Connector Trail, Rockland County - SEQR Resolution and Designation Resolution (1.83 miles, countryside)

On a motion from Jane Daniels (Kevin Burke second) the Board designated ~~eh~~the new trails adding more than 25 miles to the Greenway Trail System.

Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area

Call to Order

Acting Chairman Griffen and Chairman McHenry called the National Heritage Area (NHA) meeting to order.

Legislative Update

Mr. Castiglione announced that the HRVNHA funding authorization has been extended for two years with appropriation authority. We are one of twelve heritage areas to receive this extension to our funding authorization.

Cooperative Agreement with Hudson Valley Tourism

The Greenway will be entering into a cooperative agreement with Hudson Valley Tourism to provide \$20,000 towards the training partnership program. That program, with NYS Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation, is geared towards hospitality training and telling a better story. Part of the hospitality training will be teaching the benefits to all of referring patrons to other geographically or thematically similar sites.

Heritage Development Grant Announcement

Mr. Castiglione reminded everyone that applications are due February 14 for the \$50,000 grant program to assist sites with improving their interpretation.

Hudson River Valley Ramble

Mr. Castiglione noted that recently concluded 2013 Ramble featured some 200 events with 160 partners and an annual economic impact of \$21 million. Over 120,000 people participated this year. He noted the extraordinary work of Beth Campochiaro pulling the event together and acknowledged and thanked Fran Dunwell for the funding support received from the Hudson River Estuary Program.

Teaching the Hudson Valley

Mr. Castiglione noted that the 2013 Teaching the Hudson Valley institute was a great success, with the focus on Common Core Standards being very timely.

Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary War Trail

Mr. Castiglione announced that it is expected that the interpretive panels for the New York section of the trail will be installed this year.

Executive Director Report

Acting Executive Director Mark Castiglione's written Executive Director's report is appended to, and a part of these minutes.

Budget Updates:

Federal Budget Deal Extends Nat'l Heritage Area Funding through 2015: The recent federal budget deal included a funding extension for the Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area program through 2015. The original funding sunset was Sept. 2012. We have continued to receive funding through continuing resolutions but according to sources, this new extension will provide the Greenway about \$900,000 over the next two federal fiscal years.

Proposed State Greenway Budget: The proposed 2014-15 State Budget for the Greenway Conservancy and Greenway Council would continue funding for both organizations at 2013-14 levels. This would provide \$166,000 for the Conservancy and \$321,000 for the Greenway Council. The Council Budget includes \$136,000 for grants. The proposed budget will also reallocate \$673,000 in Council funds obligated to grants.

Project and Program Updates:

Greenway Strategic Planning Process Update: The Greenway is working with Fairweather Consulting to assist with organizational strategic planning. Kick-off meeting was held on 9-25 at the FDR Site in Hyde Park. The process has gathered input from the Strategic Plan Steering Committee, stakeholder organizations/individuals, and staff. A report of initial findings is forthcoming and will help frame topics for the Greenway Board's strategic planning retreat in March. The goals of this process include setting priorities and to create action steps to advance the organizational mission, and maximize impact within the current context, and govern future investments.

Greenway Offers HRVNHA Heritage Development Grants: This federally funded program will provide a total of \$50,000 in 1:1 matching grants for marketing, interpretation and promotion of heritage within the 10 county National Heritage Area region. Solicitation was sent on December 12 and applications are due on February 14. Anticipated grant awards will be made in March so that projects can impact the 2014 tourism season.

Greenway Completes Environmental Review and Adopts Dutchess Compact Amendments: Dutchess County submitted updates to its Greenway Compact plan Greenway Connections. The Greenway Council authorized these amendments, completed a full EAF and adopted a negative declaration at its October 16 meeting. Local governments will have the option to accept or reject these amendments. The amendments include seven new Greenway Guides on the following topics: Centers and Greenspaces; Slower, Safer Streets; Rural Roads; Convenience Stores with Gas Pumps; Building Bicycle Networks; Green Infrastructure; Recycling and Waste Collection.

Ulster County Finalizing Draft Greenway Compact Plan: Ulster County Planning convened a technical advisory committee to guide the development of their Greenway Compact Plan, "Live. Work. Play." The committee is continuing to working closely with project consultants, the Regional Plan Association, in finalizing the draft. Following public and stakeholder input, the draft plan will be finalized and tentatively submitted to the Greenway for approval in March 2014. The draft Compact called clearly identifies connections between Greenway principles and local values and identifies a framework for resource protection and economic development. In addition, design guidelines will accompany the plan making it a significant tool that communities can choose use to guide development.

Town of Stuyvesant River Access Project: The Greenway Conservancy has been holding GE environmental mitigation funds for river access improvements at the Newton (Nutten) Hook section of the town of Stuyvesant since 1995. Project originally proposed was unworkable due to site and environmental constraints but a number of recent developments/complementary projects have made it possible to complete an alternative access project at the site in partnership with DOT, DEC and the Town government. Since the improvements will occur on DEC land, Greenway is working to transfer the remaining 240K to a DEC cost center to fund construction.

2014 Path Through History / HRVNHA Interpretive Training Project: The Mid-Hudson Valley Path Through History regional workgroup, in partnership with the [Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area](#) and OPRHP has issued an RFP in order develop and conduct interpretive training for historic sites and museums that were identified through the region's Path Through History initiative. This is intended to be advanced training to help sites enhance existing offerings, imagine new opportunities and help great common narrative threads between them. Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route NHT Interpretive Project: The National Park Service along with project consultants Pannier Graphics and the Gecko Group have completed the draft plan of interpretive panels along the W3R trail in Orange, Rockland and Westchester Counties. The project team will once again consult with stakeholders in the development of the interpretive text. Installation has been delayed until 2014.

Teaching the Hudson Valley: The 2014 Summer Teachers Institute will explore sustainability topics including local agriculture and community and regional planning. For institute dates, see <http://www.teachingthehudsonvalley.org/> . Other updates include: **Explore Awards made for spring:** Todd MS, Wappingers CSD (Dutchess), 95 students to Albany Institute and Henry Hudson Planetarium and Averill Park HS, 50 to Historic Cherry Hill (Albany); **Lesson plans:** six more published, 13 pending (these came from Library of Congress, teaching about primary sources sessions and virtual book group); **Writing contest:** pending one more confirmation, we will be announcing four winners later this week or early next; **Summer institute:** theme selected, Teaching the Hudson Valley from the Ground Up, planning underway; **Refreshed website:** "soft" launch anticipated later this week or early next with "louder" launch soon; map and lesson plans continue to have security issues; funds needed to address apart from new look.

Trails:

Greenway Reviews Proposals for Water Trail Promotion/Trip Planning Project: Last year, Empire State Development awarded Greenway \$90,000 grant to promote use of the Hudson River Greenway Water Trail. The Water Trail, which spans 3 Regional Economic Development Council Regions, was recently designated a National Water Trail by the Department of the Interior. The project will include a series of maps, new smartphone optimized website, itineraries and GPS tools for kayakers. The Greenway has received proposals from a number of firms for the work and will be selecting a vendor shortly. We plan to have drafts of materials ready for summer 2014.

New Trail Designations: Nearly 26 miles of new Greenway Trail have been nominated for designation. They include:

- *Quiet Cove Riverfront Park Trails, Dutchess County (0.7 mile)*
- *Dutchess Rail Trail, Dutchess County (14 miles)*
- *Wilcox Memorial Park Trail System, Dutchess County (6 miles)*
- *Bowdoin Park Trail System, Dutchess County (3 miles)*
- *Gateway to Peck's Pond Connector Trail, Rockland County (1.83 miles)*

Legislative Updates:

Greenway Pursuing National Heritage Area Program Bill: While the HRVNHA's funding authorization was extended through federal fiscal year 2015, we will still aggressively pursue and longer-term solution through reintroduction of the National Heritage Areas Act. Previous versions of the National Heritage Area Act were co-sponsored by Members Paul Tonko (D-NY) and Charles Dent (R-PA). The Act would create a system of National Heritage Areas similar to the National Park system. Currently, the 49 National Heritage Areas are all independent partners with the National Parks Service. This bill will establish clear roles for the NPS and establish base funding for Heritage Areas within the NPS budget. We anticipate a 2014 version of this bill will be reintroduced shortly.

Board Member Updates:

Conservancy Executive Board Member Updates:

Ken Herman, Founding Conservancy Treasurer, Steps Down: Ken Herman, who has served as the Greenway Conservancy's Treasurer since its founding has decided it is time to step aside from that role. He has managed to lead the organization and maintain a strong financial foundation through the good times and the not so good times. Fortunately, he will remain on the Conservancy Board.

Kevin Burke Nominated for Greenway Conservancy Treasurer: Board Member Kevin Burke, who is currently serving as Board Secretary, has agreed to be nominated to be the Conservancy's next Treasurer. Kevin will continue to serve on the Greenway's Grants Committee. This nomination will be submitted to the Conservancy's board for their consideration at their January 29th meeting.

Jennifer Schwartz-Berky Nominated for Greenway Conservancy Secretary: Board Member Jennifer Schwartz- Berky has agreed to accept the nomination as the Conservancy's Secretary.

New Board Members:

Hon. Dini LoBue was re- appointed to the Greenway Conservancy by Senator Dean Skelos, President Pro Tem, on January 15, 2014. She was previously appointed to serve the remainder of former member Richard Wager. Ms. LoBue is a Putnam County Legislator currently serving of the Economic Development and Energy Committee.

Saveria (Sally) Mazzarella was appointed to the Greenway Council by Senator Dean Skelos, President Pro Tem, on January 23, 2014. She was previously Senator Saland's delegate to the Greenway Council. Sally has been a civic leader in the Hudson River Valley for decades. She is the founder and President of Winnakee Land Trust and Chairperson of Walkway Over the Hudson.

Staff Updates:

Performance Advances for Greenway Conservancy Employees: After applying a process in line with state Management/ Confidential employment protocols, the Greenway Conservancy conveyed performance advances or longevity payments to eligible employees consistent with advances granted to other M/C employees in May 2013.
